Poll Says: WNY Supports Metro Rail Expansion

The New Year has already brought good cheer to the CRTC, in the form of a recent poll commissioned by <u>Business First</u>. The survey, conducted in mid-November by Goldhaber Research Associates, asked 601 randomly selected adults in Erie and Niagara counties whether a second Metro Rail line should be built to connect downtown Buffalo with the airport.

This poll was an unexpected confrimation of the CRTC petition effort, completed November 1, 2004. The petition result, 10,093 signatures, provided informal evidence that the public wants Metro Rail expansion. But the scientific framework of the poll gives reliable evidence to all community leaders to show that people of WNY from diverse walks of life and backgrounds support expansion of Metro Rail to the airport from downtown Buffalo.

Results were published (12-29) as follows:

Residence: City of Buffalo residents 67% in favor, 25% opposed; Erie County suburbs 47% in favor, 35% opposed; Niagara County 46% in favor, 26% opposed.

Age: 18-to-21-year-olds 78% in favor, 17% opposed; 70 or older 44% in favor, 33% opposed.

Race: Whites 49% in favor, 32% opposed; blacks 67% in favor, 27% opposed; Hispanics 79% in favor, 21% opposed.

Income: \$25,000-\$35,000 per year, 64% in favor; \$50,000--\$75,000 per year, 47% in favor.

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Cultural Tourism Strategy to be Released

"A Cultural Tourism Strategy: Enriching Culture and Building Tourism in Buffalo Niagara," a report by the Buffalo Niagara Cultural Tourism Initiative, will be released to the public on

Thursday, January 13, 2005 at 9 a.m. in the auditorium of The Buffalo and Erie County Historical Society, 25 Nottingham Court, Buffalo.

The Cultural Tourism Initiative is an effort led by the Institute for Local Governance at UB to organize the region for improved quality, cooperation, marketing and impact for its cultural resources.

"A Cultural Tourism Strategy" proposes a structure to reinforce and align the building blocks of the cultural tourism system: 1) asset development, or investment in cultural, arts and heritage resources to strengthen them organizationally and improve visitor readiness, and, 2) targeted, research-informed marketing that both supports coordinated programs and is connected to current and planned asset development efforts.

Designed as a three-year implementation pilot, this proposal recognizes the different but complementary natures of marketing and asset development, and that each must be improved if appealing cultural tourism experiences are to be developed to allow cultural tourism to reach its potential in the Buffalo Niagara region.

At the January 13 unveiling, the strategy and particularly the proposal for its implementation will be presented in detail. Copies of the final report will be available. Public input and perspective will remain a critical part of this effort, especially as important aspects of implementation continue to evolve, including funding and leadership issues.
