A Billion for Buffalo

Gov. Cuomo made an out-sized offer in his State of the State address, Jan. 4.

He offered a billion dollars for Buffalo, citing economic need for investment in WNY. Subsequent comments in the media indicated that the intended focus of this effort was to attract more businesses to Buffalo.

But wait!

Businesses already operate in WNY, and attract employees and customers. Many of these businesses are served by public transit. But NFTA's Metro is facing drastic service cuts in order to close their 2012-2013 budget gap, resulting from decreased NYS transit assistance in recent years.

Governor, here's an offer Buffalo needs, right now--

How about \$10 million, for starters, to close the NFTA budget gap? Then a few million more-- to extend Metro Rail to the suburbs.

Governor, make us a real offer we can appreciate!

Recent analysis of Metro's economic impact on Western New York shows...

Spending \$10 million of taxpayer dollars to maintain current service prevents disruption of more than \$200 million economic impact that Metro brings to our economy. Put positively, spending \$10 million each year on Metro provides an economic impact return of 20X the investment for the taxpayer.



Congress Fails Transit Users

The monthly limit of the transit portion of the commuter benefit was reduced from \$230 per month to \$125 per month on January 1, 2012 because Congress failed to enact legislation to extend the higher level. In the meantime, the monthly limit for the parking portion of the commuter benefit increased from \$230 per month to \$240 per month due to an automatic cost of living increase. Congress missed a critical opportunity to maintain parity between the transit portion and the parking portions of the commuter benefit when it extended other tax benefits at the end of 2011.

For many commuters who use public transportation, Congress' failure to maintain parity between the transit and parking benefits results in a significant increase in their commuting costs and their annual payroll taxes – up to \$500 per year. Participating employers will also experience an increase in their payroll taxes.

Metro Ridership Rises 8% in 2011

Statistics reported to the American Public Transit Association by the NFTA show that overall ridership for Buffalo's Metro Bus and Rail increased 8.73% over 2010.

Metro Rail ridership increased 19.5%, compared to Salt Lake City, UT (21.0%) and Philadelphia, PA (10.0%).

Total annual rides are projected to exceed 30 million in 2011. This figure matches the greatest ridership in the post-World War II years, according to NFTA Executive Director Kim Minkel.

"Increased public transportation ridership may prove to be a sign of strengthening economies in several regions around the country. As more Americans return to work, public transportation serves as an economical part of their daily lives." --- APTA, 3rd Quarter report, 2011
