These efforts build on the many studies that have been done previously and incorporate new realities-- such as a shrinking population that consumes more land and demands more infrastructure. National Support for Transit Grows

A survey recently released by the American Public Transportation Association (APTA) shows that there is growing support for expanding public transportation. The survey, Americans Support for Public Transportation conducted by the Mineta Transportation Institute (MTI), shows that nearly 74 percent of respondents agreed to use of their tax dollars to create, expand and improve public transportation in their community. This number increased from 69% to 74% since 2012, showing a shift toward more Americans supporting transit investment.

The association noted that the results for the survey were consistent with the growing support on the local level. In 2012, 49 out of 62 public transit ballot initiatives were passed which represents a nearly 80 percent passage rate.

Get Ready for a New Future in Transportation

In 2012, US public transportation ridership hit record levels as Americans took 10.5 billion trips!

This is the second highest ridership since 1957, according to Michael Melaniphy, CEO of the American Public Transportation Association. Similarly, Amtrak boardings rose 55% between 1997 and 2012, more than double that of domestic aviation according to a Brookings Institute report ("A New Alignment: Strengthening America's Commitment to Passenger Rail" reported in NARP News, Vol 47 (3), April 2013).

So what is driving these dramatic shifts in transportation behavior and what do these trends say about priorities for public transportation?

An important contributor to these trends is changing demographics. In particular, but not exclusively, the millenials (those born between 1980 and 2000) are rejecting the auto-centric society we have lived with since the 1950s. They are choosing, in large numbers, to live in cities rather than suburbs, and are demanding alternative transportation options like bicycle and public transit.


Clear evidence of this shift shows up in a decreasing interest in obtaining one's drivers license. The chart below summarizes this dramatic shift, just since the 1980s.

These trends are driving new investments in public transit being made across the country. For example, cities like Pittsburg, Cleveland, Cincinnati, Memphis, Minneapolis-St. Paul, Denver, Salt Lake City, Houston, Dallas, Philadelphia, Portland, Seattle, Los Angeles, Phoenix, Atlanta, Tampa, and many more, are investing in light rail expansions. Regions that want to be successful in the 21st century need to follow the lead of these cities. This is especially true in the Buffalo-Niagara region where until very recently investments in public transit have been lagging.

The GBNRTC's One Region Forward initiative, the NFTA's ongoing Amherst Alternatives Analysis and cobblestone district study are good first steps and we strongly support them. But more needs to be done.

CRT stands ready to work with the GBNRTC, the NFTA, and leaders from across the region to find financing and resources to forge a public transportation network that will serve this area in the decades ahead. For example, work needs to

be done to plan for extending our light rail to the airport.
